LifeLight's End Times Study: Opening Prayer:

- 1. What is LifeLight?
 - a. It is an in-depth Bible study, which includes the following:
 - i. Individual daily home study: 15-30 minutes daily for 5 days each week
 - ii. In session lecture given by me
 - iii. In session, small group discussion
- 2. Weekly process:
 - a. Before each session:
 - i. You will go over a study leaflet containing a hymn, a prayer, and guided questions based on scripture pertaining to the weekly theme.
 - b. During each session:
 - i. I will present a lecture and teach on the topic.
 - ii. We will have time to go through questions together in full and small groups.
 - c. The day after the group session:
 - i. You can spend this time reviewing what you have learned.

A sigh of relief:

- 1. During each session, I'll give you a handout, mentioning which questions will be focused on during the following session. I hope to focus on about 5 questions rather than all five days of questions.
 - a. This frees you from needing to do the whole 5-day intensive study. Nonetheless, you are of course welcome to do the 5-day study.
- 2. Even without prior studying, because I will give lectures on the questions, you will be able to engage in the questions each week.
- 3. Finally, you aren't expected to make it every single week. While this will grant you the best opportunity to learn, you will be able to get a lot out of whichever weeks you are able to attend.

Big Picture:

Now that we understand LifeLight, What will we learn in this study?

- 1. In order to facilitate our discussion, we will pick 6 of these 9 sessions to focus on. Here is the selected session for next week:
 - a. 2nd Session, April 28th: "Miracles with a Purpose"
 - i. Topic: Miracles have a purpose, namely to point us to God's identity, messengers, and truths. Here, we'll learn about God's purpose behind miracles.
 - ii. Here we'll focus on the following questions:
 - b.

Choice of Topics (chose five of the following):

- 1. Miracles and Science:
 - a. Christians have a ready and winsome response to the objections raised against the veracity of the miracle accounts in the Bible. Here we'd consider the relationship between miracles and science.

- 2. <u>The Mighty Acts of God: Miracles in the Old Testament:</u>
 - a. OT miracles are God's signature to His judgements and promises, especially at times of significant revelation. Here we'd consider the relationship between OT miracles and the miracles of Jesus.
- 3. Jesus' Miracles of Power over Sickness:
 - a. Jesus' healing miracles in the gospels confirm His identity, character, and purpose. Here we'd consider the relationship between Jesus' miracles and his identity, character, and purpose.
- 4. The Miraculous Power of Jesus over Satan:
 - a. As Jesus drives out demons, we are assured of His authority over them and of their ultimate defeat. Here we'd consider Jesus' relationship to the devil by considering some of his confrontations with the devil and the devil's minions.
- 5. <u>The Miraculous Power of Jesus over Creation:</u>
 - a. Jesus' miracles reveal Him as Creator, Redeemer, and Deliverer, the One who controls the forces of His creation. Here we'd consider Jesus' immanent NT relationship to the transcendent God of the OT.
- 6. Jesus' Miracles of Power over Death:
 - Jesus' resurrection miracles reveal His power over death and foreshadow both His resurrection and that of all who believe in Him. Here we'd consider how Jesus raises others – and himself – from the dead.
- 7. Apostolic Miracles:
 - a. After Jesus' ascension and the sending of the Holy Spirit, god used miracles to confirm the message of Jesus' apostles and commissioned servants. Here we'd consider especially the apostle's miracles recorded in Acts.
- 8. Miracles Today:
 - a. God still performs miracles today. Here, we'd consider miracles today and what to think of them.

Closing Prayer:

Dear Heavenly Father, we praise you for being a God who reveals himself to us through Jesus and your word in the scriptures. Help us, we pray, to better know you from our study of miracles. In Jesus' name, amen.
