Take Away: (2 mins)

I urge you to consider two things this week:

- 1. Meditate on Moses' struggles and God's constant presence. God didn't always step in when Moses wanted him to, but God always came in his own time.
- 2. Meditate on your own struggles. Have you been groaning to God? How is God reminding you of his faithfulness even while you sin? Remember: just as God could handle the Israelite's and Moses' groaning, he can handle yours!

Closing Prayer: (2 mins)

Dear Heavenly Father, who else is like you? Who else would hear his groaning people -- even as they blame you? Who else would deliver and redeem such a people? Considering your great deeds for the Israelites, we are bold to ask you to act in our lives this week. Grant us confidence to pray to you because you have been faithful to so many sinners before us. Grant us you deliverance each day this week and the faith to trust that you are always faithful. In Jesus' name, Amen.
